#### **Recommendation:**

That Academic Board Standing Committee approves the programme documentation for the following training scheme, effective from Semester 1 2019, for submission to NZQA:

 Nursing Competency Assessment Programme Training Scheme with strands in Competency Assessment for Return to Nursing, and Competency Assessment for Internationally Qualified Nurses (Level 7, 30 Credits)

# **Rationale**

The proposed Nursing Competency Assessment Programme Training Scheme sits within the Nursing Practice Pathway.

This proposal seeks to establish a training scheme to replace two short courses with a training scheme. This proposal also ensures compliance with TEC and NZQA rules regarding International Student access to a Competency Assessment Programme for Internationally Qualified Nurses (L7)

This is a replacement for existing courses of the same length to comply with TEC and NZQA rules.

The documentation has been reviewed by the Academic Approvals Committee (AAC) to ensure that it meets Unitec and NZQA regulatory and compliance requirements. The recommendations made by the AAC were addressed as appropriate and approved at the Committee meeting of 5 September 2018. The AAC now recommend that Academic Board approve this programme for submission to NZQA.

# Short Course / Training Scheme / Vocational Pathway Course Details

This training scheme is design with two strands:

Strand one is entitled 'Return to Nursing' and is for New Zealand Registered Nurses who are required by Nursing Council to complete the scheme to obtain a current practising certificate; and New Zealand Registered Nurses who have been directed to undertake a competence assessment programme by Nursing Council of New Zealand or an employer. Strand two is entitled 'Internationally-qualified Nurses', and is for Internationally-qualified Nurses who currently live in New Zealand or those who are visiting New Zealand and want to gain the skills and knowledge to practice within New Zealand's health context.

#### Structure of the scheme

Both strands share the majority of class work in the scheme which runs over 12 weeks (full and part-time). This scheme has some flexibility, designed to meet individual needs.

The scheme includes a six-week theoretical component shared between the two strands, including applied learning at Waitakere Hospital's Simulation Lab. The theoretical component runs two days a week, 9am-3pm.

Students will complete 6 weeks of clinical practice where they are required to attend placement Monday to Friday. Shift times are 7am-3pm or 3-11pm unless requested otherwise by the clinical placement.

During the theory-weeks and mid-way through the clinical experience students will be assessed formatively. A clinical portfolio will be collected and clinical performance will be assessed at the end of the clinical experience by a Nurse Lecturer or Clinical Educator. Clinical practice placements provided are in acute, primary or aged care facilities only.

# **English Language Admission Requirements:**

Applicants must have achieved a minimum standard of English as demonstrated by a minimum of 8 credits at NCEA Level 2 in English (4 in Reading, 4 in Writing).

International applicants must also meet the English Language Entry Requirements.

Applicants must have at least **ONE** of the following:

- A. Gained NCEA level 3 and met New Zealand University Entrance requirements;
- B. Clear evidence that they satisfy one of the criteria for existing English proficiency:
  - 1) Previous primary and secondary study in English: International students from countries with a student visa approval rate of at least 80 per cent1 that can provide clear evidence of either:
    - a) completion of all primary education and at least three years of secondary education (that is, the equivalent of New Zealand Forms 3 to 7 or years 9 to 13), or
    - b) completion of at least five years of secondary education (that is, the equivalent of New Zealand Forms 3 to 7 or years 9 to 13) at schools using English as the language of instruction are eligible for enrolment at all levels of the NZOF.
  - 2) Previous tertiary study in English: International students are eligible for enrolment at all levels of the NZQF when they can provide clear evidence of completion of a Bachelor Degree, Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Bachelor Honours Degree, Postgraduate Certificate, Postgraduate Diploma, Master's Degree or Doctoral Degree with English as the language of instruction, from tertiary education providers from New Zealand, Australia, Canada, the Republic of Ireland, South Africa, the United Kingdom or the United States.

# Teaching to Adults (CELTA)

#### **Selection Criteria:**

Selection for each strand of this training scheme will be determined at the time of enrolment according to the following:

- Strand one 'Return to Nursing' and is for New Zealand Registered Nurses who are required by Nursing Council to complete the scheme to obtain a current practising certificate; and New Zealand Registered Nurses who have been directed to undertake a competence assessment programme by Nursing Council of New Zealand or an employer.
- Strand two 'Internationally-qualified Nurses', is for Internationally-qualified Nurses who currently live in New Zealand or those who are visiting New Zealand and want to gain the skills and knowledge to practice within New Zealand's health context.

# **Integrated Work-based Components:**

Students must attend 100% of off-site clinical practice. Any student who does not meet this requirement will need to make up clinical hours as determined by the Course co-ordinator and the Clinical co-ordinator.

# **Assessment Grading Basis:**

Course grades will be determined according to the following criteria. Students must achieve all of the outcomes in order to pass competency based assessment.

CBA - Competency based assessment [M; P; NC]

# Assessment in Te Reo Māori:

All students have the right to submit any summative assessment task in Te reo Māori. The process for submission of summative assessment work in Te reo Māori is detailed on Programme Moodle pages and other course material.

Assessment in Te Reo Māori is governed by the Unitec Assessment in Te Reo Māori policy.

# Submission and late submission of work:

- Applications for extensions must be made in line with Practice Pathway/Network practice or under the Special Assessment Circumstances policy.
- No assignments will be accepted five (5) days (inclusive of weekends) after the due date.

# **Resubmission or Reassessment:**

- A student may apply to undertake a resubmission/reassessment for a failed assessment within 5 days of receiving their marked assessment.
- Students is entitled to only one reassessment in their course.
- All resubmissions/reassessments will be carried out within a specified time period as agreed with the relevant academic authority.
- The maximum grade for any resubmission/reassessment of an assessment is the lowest pass grade.

Assessment

To successfully pass a course and to be recommended to the NZNC for a current practicing certificate or New Zealand Registration, applicants must meet minimum standards on the NZNC's four domains of competence as confirmed by the NZNC in relation to the RN scope(s) of practice (including individual conditions).

Item 1: Nursing Practice assessment

The student must demonstrate minimum safety standards in practice related to Nursing Council Competencies within the four domains of practice.

#### Formative:

- On-going assessment and feedback of nursing practice through the work-based practice experience(s) on NZNC competencies.
- Mid-way nursing practice assessment during the key/acute care experience (self/clinical and academic staff)

# Summative

- Final assessment for those with Mental Health scope of practice (if required) at the end of the Continuing Care experience
- Final nursing clinical practice assessment in the final week of practice (acute care or selected area of practice).
- Portfolio of evidence is submitted in the final week of the course
   To successfully pass this course and to be recommended to the NZNC for
   New Zealand Registration, applicants must achieve the NCNZ competencies within the four domains of competence.

# Item 2: Portfolio of evidence.

This is submitted in the final week of the course. The Portfolio of evidence is designed to allow the student to demonstrate attainment of the learning outcomes employing a variety of methods, including:

- Nursing practice evaluations and assessment (Self; Clinical/Academic staff) - Midway and end of experience
- Exemplar/Reflection
- Current nursing evidence-based publication relevant to practice and applied to client care.
- Presentation evaluation and overview (related to Domain 2 NC: Management of Nursing Care)
- Client assessment and nursing care plan.
- Clinical based assessment/ handover.
- CPR Certificate

Any other item of evidence the candidate wishes to submit that contributes to demonstration of competence in practice.

Unitec's Moderation of Assessment Policy stipulates that a system of internal and external moderation is applied to summative assessments in all Unitec programmes. This Training Scheme will be accredited and monitored against the Nursing Council's Competence Assessment Programme standards. This Training Scheme is a replacement for existing short course of the same length to comply with TEC and NZQA rules.

Both internal and external moderation of assessment will be undertaken to ensure valid, reliable and consistent standards of assessment are maintained throughout the scheme. Moderation will ensure that assessment decisions are fair and reflect the marking guides, learning outcomes and graduate profile. Moderation is a negotiated process of agreement between designer and moderator (pre) and between moderator and marker (post).

Moderation's main purpose is for continuous improvement with outcomes reported in a constructive and informative way. Results of moderation will be included in Self-Assessment and be recorded in Course Evaluation and Planning reports.

### Quality moderation processes assure:

- All relevant information relating to the assessment process is provided.
- Assessment documentation is complete and the instructions to the student are clear.
- Assessments and learning activities are mapped to the learning outcomes and graduate profile and are at the appropriate level.
- Marking criteria/guides, marks available and model answers are correct and clearly stated.

Moderation

- Assessment processes are valid, authentic, consistent and easily understood.
- Changes recommended by moderators to improve assessments are incorporated where appropriate.

## **Moderation Plan:**

These courses will be externally moderated by ARA Institute of Technology.

- Internal Pre-Moderation of assessment will occur prior to each delivery and will confirm the elements of the Portfolio of Evidence.
- Internal Post-Moderation of assessment will occur following each delivery and will be undertaken by a senior member of the Nursing Staff.
- External Moderation will occur immediately following the first delivery of the newly approved course, and then on a cycle of once every three delivery.

# **Recommendation:**

That Academic Board Standing Committee approves the programme documentation for the following training scheme, effective from Semester 1 2019, for submission to NZQA:

Approval of Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing (Level 7, 360 Credits)

# <u>Rationale</u>

The growth in recognition of the veterinary nursing profession brings an increased need for robust, evidence-based programmes of study that provide veterinary nurses the skills and knowledge they need to carry out the responsibilities associated with the role. Currently, there are limited opportunities in New Zealand for veterinary nursing students to complete study above Level 6. Unitec currently offers programmes leading to veterinary nursing qualifications at Level 5 and Level 6.

The Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing builds on the success of the current pathways, enabling graduates of the NZ Diploma in Veterinary Nursing (Level 6), to transition into a Bachelor's degree, by adding an additional year of full-time study to currently-available programmes at levels 5 and 6.

In August 2018, a proposal was submitted to the NZQA by Unitec for a veterinary nursing major within the existing Bachelor of Applied Science. This was however, withdrawn, following feedback from NZQA.

This proposal for a standalone Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing is being submitted after incorporating feedback from NZQA as well as key external industry stakeholders, graduates, current students and readers of the original programme document.

The additional level 7 year includes a core of compulsory courses (including research methods and a research project) and a range of electives in animal behaviour and welfare, conservation, biosecurity, business, communication and te ao Māori, and a work-based Internship course.
Content:	Internationally, veterinary nursing is a regulated profession; veterinary nurses are generally required to have a Bachelor-level degree or equivalent in order to meet regulatory requirements. Whilst registration for veterinary nurses in New Zealand is currently voluntary, the growth in recognition of veterinary nursing as a profession in New Zealand brings an increased need for robust, evidence-based programmes of study that provide veterinary nurses the skills and knowledge they need to carry out the growing responsibilities associated with the role.

# **Background and Rationale**

The Master of Teaching and Education Leadership was approved by NZQA at the end of 2017, and is delivered by The Mind Lab.

Through discussions relating to course set up earlier in the year, it became evident that there is an error in the stated number of total weeks (including holiday weeks) in the factual summary and subsequently, the NZQA Programme details information for the degree.

The correct calculation, as confirmed by relevant staff members from Mind Lab and Unitec, is the following:

- Total 100 weeks (of which 10 are in summer semester)
- Weeks per year is 45
- Dividing the remaining 10 summer school weeks by 2 (for an average per year), it comes to 50 weeks per year

This correction has been endorsed by the Academic Approvals Committee, and discussed with NZQA. Once approved, this will be formally submitted to NZQA with a request to make the corresponding change to the information appearing in the approved Programme Details Form.
