Subject Programme Approval – Bachelor of Policing

Recommendation:

That Academic Board approves the following programme, effective from Semester 1 2019, for submission to NZQA:

Bachelor of Policing (Level 7, 360 credits)

Rationale

This new programme sits in the Health & Community Network

Unitec is seeking approval and accreditation to offer a new undergraduate programme: the *Bachelor of Policing* (BPolice). Unitec and the Wellington-based NZ Police College ("the Police College") will work as partners to deliver this programme.

Until now, the New Zealand Police ("NZ Police") have operated the sole training establishment for police constables and associated research facility focusing on policing practice. This development is in line with international trends in policing education, and a growing number of industries undergoing a process of "professionalisation" in line with an increased emphasis on critical, reflective practice, credentialing frameworks and broader recognition of standards for practice.

The programme document has been reviewed by the Academic Approvals Committee (AAC), which has not recommended it for submission to NZQA. Paraphrasing, the AAC's principal concern relates to whether or not this programme meets NZQA criteria related to a L7 degree programme, or is more in the order of a "training programme".

While we acknowledge this lack of endorsement, it is the view of myself and of the Interim CE Merran Davis, the Interim Chief Financial Officer David Glover, and the Dean of the Health & Community Network Debra Robertson-Welsh that we seek approval for submission to NZQA for the following reasons:

- 1. The qualification and associated programme are a new type for NZ; effectively an "apprenticeship degree" of a type recently developed in the UK for policing education and other professional areas, and not characteristic of conventional L7 degrees.
- 2. NZQA and TEC have previously met with Unitec and NZ Police and expressed their desire to see this application be made and to succeed.
- 3. Submission to NZQA will allow this new type of qualification to be "tested" and allow the earlier dialogue about the nature of the programme with NZQA (and with TEC) to continue.

General admission requirements

- NCEA Level 3 including:
- a. Three subjects at Level 3 or above, made up of 14 credits each, in three subjects;
- b. Literacy: 10 credits at Level 2 or above (made up of 5 credits in reading and 5 in writing);
- c. Numeracy: 10 credits at Level 1 or above, made up of:
- i. Achievement standards: specified achievement standards are available through a range of subjects; or
- ii. Unit standards: package of three numeracy unit standards (26623, 26626, 26627 all three required)

English language admission requirements

Applicants must have achieved a minimum standard of English as demonstrated by a minimum of eight credits at NCEA Level 2 in English (4 in Reading, 4 in Writing).

Selection Criteria

Selection will be made by NZ Police National Recruitment, using their established criteria for admission to constable training. To apply for training, individual must:

- hold a full New Zealand driver's licence;
- be a New Zealand or Australian Citizen or a New Zealand Permanent Resident;
- complete a NZ Police Consent to Disclosure of Information Form
- have no medical conditions that would impair their ability to carry out any policing duties;
- successfully complete NZ Police National Recruitment literacy and numeracy assessments;
- successfully complete upto 40-hour observation in the NZ Police workplace;
- successfully complete the *Introduction to Police Studies in Aotearoa/New Zealand* course (15 credits);
- successfully complete the physical appraisal test set by NZ Police;
- successfully complete an interview with NZ Police National Recruitment;
- successfully complete a safety checking process, as set out in the Requirements for Safety Checks of Children's Workers section of the Vulnerable Children Regulations (2015).

Selection will be made by NZ Police National Recruitment with the delegated authority of Unitec to offer places to applicants.
