interweaved within contemporary dance.


The Residency will culminate in a studio showing on May 15 with details to be announced closer to the time. (Photography by Melissa Duff)

The album, founded on the fear of finality, was ironically their last. Now they are reuniting to bring to Auckland Arts Festival a 2020 reinterpretation of the Taite Prizenominated opus in its entirety, accompanied by special musical guests with lighting by Unitec grad **Brad Gledhill**.
