storytelling shows to the front yards of isolated people throughout Auckland, Te Pou preparing to hit the streets with their Front Yard Festival as soon as alert levels allow. Te Pou Director and Unitec grad, **Tainui Tukiwaho** (Billy in Billy T James, Step Dave, Almighty Johnson) – pictured - and co-director Jarod Rawiri have each created a short piece of

theatre to entertain and enrich the days of our elders who have been highly isolated, and may remain in isolation significantly longer than younger or less vulnerable people. Read more <u>here</u>.

# Creative NZ moves forward deadlines for COVID-19 Emergency Support

In just four weeks, Creative New Zealand has invested almost \$8 million of an available \$16 million through Phase 1 of its COVID-19 Emergency Response Package and, due to the overwhelming response, will shorten the application timeframe for two opportunities to ensure it has sufficient resources and can continue to effectively plan its Phase 2 support for the arts sector as the environment changes again. The closing date for applying for both the Emergency Relief Grant (for loss of income) and the Arts Continuity Grant (project funding to 30 September), has moved forward from 18 June to 29 May. The closing date for the Short-term Relief for Investment Clients remains at 31 May. Read more <a href="here">here</a>.

Since 2015, the NZFC has awarded an annual scholarship to female filmmakers in areas of the industry where female participation has historically been low.
