Student evaluations response rates needs to be improve across Unitec. A more indepth review is needed.

Risk register training has been completed as a school with Simon Tries. We now have a better understanding about how to use this tool at PAQC and at a department level

Priority Group Strategies

Process

The school of community studies has been highly engaged in the I See Me initiatives. All staff have just attended a refresher with actions to come. Community studies PAQC is highly confident in the schools engagement in United institutional strategies.

Some challenges have been the balance between priorities of teaching and learning and compliance and oversight particularly for ECE and Sport. These two programmes have strong whakawhanaungatanga built into the first 6 weeks of semester. The mandatory engagement in Unitec wide I See me initiative meant each programme had to give up some of the existing initiatives driven internally. Whanau, Fono evening and powhirir were examples of where each programme were already engaging and now have to integrate into Unitec wide initiatives. Unitec wide initiatives unfortunately don't cater to specifically creating whakawhanaungatanga within the programmes. We do understand the need for Unitec to



help programmes that were not engaging in these initiatives however there has been a cost to the programmes already engaging. Feedback has been given about each initiative and we are sure improvements will be made in the future.

Learner outreach programme has been another instance of the difficulty in balance where programmes have been running their own student at risk tracking. The new Unitec tracking system hasn't worked yet for the school. The LOP has had to much workload allocated to trades and community studies. Positively the school is now being allocated a full time LOP were we can now work on integrating the two systems.

Summary

NZEX and BSPT

Several inaccuracies have been highlighted in the data and several attempts have been made to update the data which did not save. There are no Extreme risk categories for these programmes

BTECE – The BTECE risk registrar is rated less favorably than the explanations provided. For example, extreme risk is related to compliance with teaching council. All ECE programmes are up for redevelopment Nationally because of new teaching council requirements. These need to be completed in 2022. Currently, the team is waiting on the business case approval from Unitec before redevelopment can occur. We suggest a review of the registrar in relation to the risk matrix.

MOST –The extreme risk identified is related to the potential loss of teaching staff having a significant impact on all students. As this is a teach out programme and there are not many students left. Any specialized staffing that is lost will have a large impact on all the remaining students. The chair is however happy with the management of this risk as it cannot be fully removed.

Student Evaluation of Courses

Summary of response rates for programmes

Engagement continues to be an issue. Across the school response rates are far below the target. Another more in depth review needs to take place. Ongoing issues such as the evaluations being sent from Simon Nash's email where students reported deleting it as they thought it was spam. Improvements in the response rates are needed as the low number limits the confidence and conclusions that can be drawn from the data.

BHSD's higher response rate is due to being a teach out programme where 4 students make up the 34.9%

Community studies PAQC is not satisfied with the survey response rate.




Course Evaluation and Planning
