As the Pacific Librarian at Unitec, I acknowledge the on-going partnership with Library and Pacific Centre to ensure that we grow our Pacific profiles through networking and interacting with colleagues who share the same passion and commitment to serve our Pacific staff and students. In Fijian culture, the concept of solesolevaki is vital to our way of life – the practice of working together for the collective.

Milestone at Unitec: I have worked in academic libraries for almost 15 years and the kaupapa that is important in my everyday mahi are enabling access to appropriate Pacific resources and ensuring that equitable services are available to our Pacific students who use the library and space.

Personal milestone: My dream is to establish a library in one of the outer islands in Fiji. It could be in the next 5 or 10 years when I get an opportunity to return home and give something back to my people and community. I would like to explore how libraries are focusing on sustainability and climate change; also addressing the local needs of preserving our cultural heritage in a built environment.

Jeron Gwaite'e joined us at Unitec in 2020 on a Manaaki New Zealand Scholarship, awarded by the New Zealand Government. This is a highly sought-after scholarship that attracts thousands of applications but only approximately 450 are awarded each year.

He had only been with us for a few weeks when we were thrown into our first lockdown. Amid stay-at-home orders, Jeron had to pivot and adjust to online learning, got to know his flatmates really, really well and still achieved in his classes.

COVID-19 provided challenges to everyone, especially those who loved to be active and outdoors. When restrictions started lifting, Jeron joined the Futsal team at Unitec and remained involved until the end of his scholarship. Jeron was also a keen explorer making the most of his time in Aotearoa New Zealand by buying a small car and travelling up and down the country.


